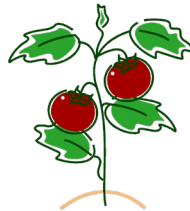

Section A: Garden Produce

A cup will be awarded for the highest number of points in this section. For interest, the variety could be shown on a label, if known.

Flowers

In judging, special attention will be given to condition and uniformity

Vegetables

A 3-inch stalk should be left on root vegetables. Tomatoes must have calyx left on.

 - a) 6 of one variety, each not exceeding 8oz
 - b) 2 of one variety, each exceeding 8oz

 - d) Shallots, 6
24. Carrots 3 of one variety
25. Tomatoes
 - a) Small. Less than 3 cm diameter (a truss of tomatoes which do not need to be of uniform colour).
 - b) Large. Greater than 3cm diameter. 3 of one variety
26. Runner beans 4
27. Other beans 4 of one variety
28. The longest runner bean
29. Marrow uniform colour, less than 22 inches
30. Squash
31. Pumpkin -largest circumference
32. An exotic or unusual vegetable
33. An aubergine
34. Sweetcorn 2 still in their husks
35. Leeks 3
36. Beetroot 3 of one variety, with 3 inch stalks
37. Heaviest cucumber
38. Five different vegetables on a plate

Section B: Home Produce

A cup will be awarded for the highest number of points in this section.

Baking (most ingredients available from the Village Shop)

- 43. 3 Cupcakes
- 44. Bread a) Traditional 2lb loaf using any flour and yeast, machine made
 b) Traditional 2lb loaf using any flour and yeast, handmade
- 45. Victoria sandwich
- 46. An iced chocolate cake
- 47. 4 chocolate brownies
- 48. Plate of biscuits6
- 49. Sweet scones4
- 50. Savoury scones e.g. cheese, tomato etc.....4
- 51. Quiche made with home-made pastry

Preserves

- 52. Jar of home-made jam (any fruit)
- 53. Jar of marmalade
- 54. Jar of chutney
- 55. Jar of honey
- 56. Lemon curd
- 57. Jar of home-made jelly (any fruit)

Eggs

- 58. A nest of eggs (to include at least 4 home laid eggs)

Other

Judging of drinks will include the presentation of the bottle

- 59. One bottle of homemade alcoholic beverage eg wine/beer/gin etc
- 60. One bottle of homemade soft drink (e.g. ginger beer, lemonade, elderflower, apple)
- 61. One portion of homemade curry in foil container with lid, no larger than 4x6". Ingredients to be listed.

Section C: Crafts

Flower Arranging

A cup will be awarded for the highest number of points in this section. You do not need to have grown everything yourself. No restriction on size unless otherwise stated.

62. A mixed flower arrangement not to exceed 60cms in height
63. A flourish of foliage an arrangement to highlight beauty of foliage
64. A decorative floral wreath, not to exceed 40cms diameter, either on wire or oasis
65. A petite arrangement for a breakfast tray, no more than 5 x 5 x 5 inches
66. Flower arrangement in an unusual container

Crafts

A cup will be awarded for the highest number of points in this section. Entries can be made from a kit or pattern, or designed by the entrant. Items will be judged on quality of finish.

67. A photo on the theme 'repurposing'
68. A photo of flora or fauna
69. Painting or drawing (any medium)
70. Needlecraft /Embroidery from a kit
71. Needlecraft/Embroidery not from a kit (this could include cross-stitch, machine embroidery, wool embroidery (crewel or 'tapestry'), or the use of any other threads or beads etc. to embellish fabric)
72. A piece of patchwork and/or quilting
73. A crocheted or knitted item
74. Anything made from recycled material, i.e. an upcycled item
75. A handmade card
76. A 3D printed model

The Show Committee also wishes to encourage people to enter items of craft for exhibition, without necessarily entering them for judging.

Section D: Children's Schedule

Children can enter any categories they want including those in other sections, any points that they are awarded in other sections will be added to the points they are awarded in the Children's section. A cup will be awarded for the highest number of points.

Entries to the Children's section are divided into the following age groups:

- Pre-school age
- 5-7 years
- 8-12 years

There are different categories for each age group. The judges will take into account a child's age, so make sure it is clearly marked on your entry form. All the children who enter will receive a token gift. Prizes will only be awarded to children who win 'First Prize'.

Pre - school

78. A farm animal made out of anything

5 – 7 years

80. A picture in any medium
81. Bake and decorate 3 biscuits or cup cakes
82. A miniature garden on a plate

8 – 12 years

83. A picture in any medium

85. A picture or collage made from pips, seeds, pulses or a mixture of all of these

All ages

86. Anything you have grown
87. A photograph of your pet or other animal
88. Construction/model – from a kit or hand made
89. Vegetable animal
90. A recycled/repurposed item

Judges and judging

Our judges are impartial, independent and not members of the Village Show committee.

Rules for the Hagbourne Village Show

1. All entrants must be resident in the Hagbournes, children (and their families) attending the Hagbourne school, members of the Hagbourne Garden Club or anyone who gardens an allotment in the Hagbourne Parish.
2. All entries must have been grown, except for flower arrangements, or made by the exhibitor. Pot plants should have been owned by the exhibitor for at least three months.
3. Judgement will include the condition and uniformity of the specimens, as well as the size and colour. All fruits should be fully ripe.
4. All exhibits must be staged between 9.00 a.m. and 11.00 a.m. separately according to the class in which they are entered. Staging will be carried out with the help and supervision of committee members. No exhibitor may enter the hall between 11.00 a.m. and 2.00 p.m.
5. The committee will take all possible care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
6. The judges are at liberty to taste all produce.
7. The committee have the power, on the recommendation of the judges, to give extra prizes where considered desirable, or to withhold any prize should the exhibits be considered of poor standard.
8. The judge's decision will be final.
9. Contravention of these rules renders the exhibitor liable to disqualification.
10. All craft articles must have been completed during the last two years. For craft items, judgement will take account of artistic merit and creativity.
11. All exhibitors may make up to three entries for any one class.
12. All produce not removed after Prize-giving will be auctioned.

Handy Hints

- a) Uniformity is more important than size. For example, three high quality, equally sized specimens are better than one large one and two smaller ones.
- b) Fruits and vegetables should be exhibited with their natural bloom and NOT polished.
- c) Fruits (Including apples) should have their stalks left on and handled by the stalks where possible. Avoid handling any exhibit more than strictly necessary.
- d) Root crops should be lifted carefully. For this, it is often helpful to water them the day before and this helps to keep the exhibit fresh after lifting. To remove the soil, wash carefully using a sponge or soft cloth, and never use a brush. After washing, wrap in a damp cloth.
- e) State the variety of fruit or vegetable when possible.
- f) With flowers, if necessary, protect blooms from the weather before the Show.
- g) Removal of secondary shoots and buds will usually enhance the main bloom.
- h) Cut flowers in the evening or early morning with as long a stem as possible and make a slanting cut.
- i) Preserves should be in well-polished jars, clearly labelled with contents and date, and filled to the top.

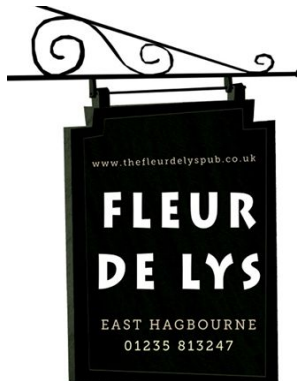
