Rector's Reflections Our Choices Matter

I wonder if you have ever thought about what it is that makes a human being a human being? What is it that distinguishes a human being from a robot or a computer? What is lost when we replace a human being with a piece of clever AI?

Some philosophers and theologians would argue that the distinctive thing about a human being is that human beings have the ability to think. However, with the rise of ever-more intelligent computers, it seems hard to maintain the position that human beings have the monopoly on thought.

Others have suggested that human beings are unique because only human beings have a "soul" – but this is also problematic, because there is no universal definition of what a "soul" is, if indeed such a thing actually exists at all. Others have suggested that human beings are unique because they have the ability to reflect, and that only human beings are "conscious" and "self-aware"; again, this is disputed, and some would argue that other organisms have the ability to reflect on themselves and their environment.

At this point, you may be thinking to yourself: what about feelings? Are humans unique because only humans have feelings? Again, this claim would be disputed. Many other life forms demonstrate responses which might be considered to be "emotional".

But there is a further aspect to being human, which I think has often been downplayed. Human beings aren't simply machines which think. We are also ethical beings, capable of making conscious choices: choosing what seems to be good, and rejecting what seems to be bad. At a philosophical level, it is possible to debate the extent to which the choices human beings make are genuinely free choices, or whether they have been pre-determined in some sort of way. But at the end of the day, human beings make choices, and these are influenced or directed by an ethical code.

Our society as a whole is the result of the sum of the choices we all make together, and the choices which have been made in previous generations.

Having experienced such an unusually hot and dry spell of weather over recent weeks, I'm sure many if not all of us will be thinking hard about the choices we make about the way we live our lives and care for the environment. Man-made climate change is a painful reality, but each one of us still has the ability to make choices which show we care for our world. We can still make a difference, if we act decisively and if we act now.

There are lots of ways we can explore further what this might mean for us in our own lives, but you might well find two upcoming events both interesting and helpful.

Both will take place at **St Andrew's Hagbourne**: the first is a talk about "*The environmental costs of AI*", at **6pm on Sunday 13th September**; and the second is a *Climate Q & A* at **5pm on Sunday 11th October**. There is no charge for either event, and you would be most welcome.

The Church of England celebrates Creationtide and during this time we...

- **Focus on God as Creator:** It's a time to acknowledge and give thanks for God's creation and to reflect on the relationship between God, humanity, and the natural world.
- **Focus on our environmental responsibility:** It's an opportunity to consider the impact of human actions on the environment and to renew commitments to caring for the planet. Many churches incorporate Creationtide into their Harvest celebrations, giving thanks for the food and resources provided by God's creation.
- **Focus on a deepening connection with our faith:** It encourages churches and individuals to connect their faith with environmental concerns, prompting reflection and action.



The culmination of Creationtide will be a **Q&A on Climate on Sunday afternoon 11th October at St Andrew's Hagbourne**. Our MP, Olly Glover, will be on our panel. We are very happy that the Climate Q&A is will be preceded a few days earlier by the showing of *The People's Emergency Briefing*, hosted by **Sustainable Blewbury** in Blewbury Village Hall on Tuesday 6th October.

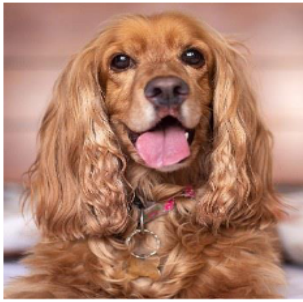

Since then, the charity has expanded to a membership of 4 million across 84 countries. On that day Mary Sumner was also celebrated at Choral Evensong in Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. Many members from Oxford Diocese joined the congregation for an uplifting service. MU banners were displayed and prayers for MU were given. How fitting that visitors from many different nations were present.

There is much that goes on overseas:

- A worldwide parenting programme
- Literacy circles and savings groups in developing countries
- Community resilience training in places where disasters are likely to occur

Tribute to Mary Myrtle Rhoda Jones

30th January 1933 – 24th June 2026

Mary was born at home in an area of East Hagbourne known as Tadley on Monday 30th January 1933, close to the Spread Eagle pub which her grandparents ran. Her dad was known as Farmer and her mum as Edie. She did not have any siblings but grew up in close friendship with her cousins Joan and Brian. Sadly, Joan has already passed away. The three children enjoyed quite a lot of freedom, yet also had to help out in the pub. During the War they sometimes played in a tin bath, paddling it up and down the nearby Tadley Brook. They used to cover it with some material, but they still got told off by the Air Raid Warden that a torch light was showing. Back at the pub, Mary recalls that she would sometimes lay under a beer barrel to catch drops to drink.

Mary attended Hagbourne Primary School, whose head was Mr Parsons, after which she went on to St Frideswide Secondary School in Didcot. In her childhood, Mary loved to draw and her artistic talents re-emerged later in life to great success. At the age of about twelve, Mary achieved the great distinction of competing in the long jump event at the All-England athletics championships which took place at Eton College.

She was certainly a bright pupil, and her teachers could see that she had potential to go to university, most especially in the subjects of History and English Literature. She was particularly fond of the writings of Charles Dickens and Thomas Hardy. Sadly, Mary's family did not approve of her going to university. When Mary left school, she secured employment as a machinist in the Boulton Glove Factory in Lydalls Road where many local women worked. She made leather gloves and was very proud of the quality of her work.

Mary met Ron at the village youth club, which was quite fortunate because Mary was not allowed out very much as her grandparents, running the Spread Eagle pub in East Hagbourne required her to help out a lot. But nevertheless, romance was ignited between Ron and Mary, leading first to them courting and then to their wedding on Saturday 3rd April 1954 at St Andrew's Church, East Hagbourne. They enjoyed their honeymoon in Southsea before initially settling back in the village at Bakers Lane with Mary's parents, so they could help her Mum who was deaf. Often in later life, Mary would ensure the family made repeat visits to Southsea, because the honeymoon there meant so much to her. Mary's Mum Edie was a strict matriarch. Robert's birth took place in October 1955 and in due course the whole family moved to their present home in New Road, where Marilyn was born in 1958. For a time, Mary's parents also lived in the home at New Road.

Robert and Marilyn recall one Christmas where they were upstairs and heard their parents having a go on a pogo stick which was to be a present. They also recall pre-motorway family holidays to Looe in Cornwall where they would set off very early in the morning to beat the traffic and get onto the beach by 10.00am. The family also took a caravan to the New Forest for some years, Ron would take Mary and the children down there in the car and leave them for a week while he was at work.

In the late 1960s and early 1970s Mary proudly became one of the first lady coach drivers in Didcot. The company for whom she worked went through a series of takeovers, starting as Reliable, with its pink and white coaches, then it became Happy Wanderers. After that, the coach firm became Tappins Happy Wanderers, and then finally, simply Tappins. Mary worked part-time doing school runs and then bringing workers home from Culham.

It was when Mary was 60 years old that she learnt to swim, having previously been too scared to try. She progressed well and eventually swam every week, initially at Berinsfield and then at Didcot Wave. When she retired, Mary rekindled her artistic interest and became skilled at very intricate water colour paintings, most especially of flowers and wildlife. She was assisted in this through attending art classes in the village, led by Peter Dewar. She really loved those classes and the confidence they gave her. In turn, this hobby led to a special friendship developing with Ron and Mags, which Mary much appreciated. On occasions, Mary painted birthday cards for her grandchildren, and she even had one painting published in a local calendar.

Mary leaves grandchildren Chris, Nick, Adam, Ben, and Rebecca as well as great-grandchildren Phoebe, Fleur, Rosie, and Richie. Mary loved to watch them play in the garden. Ron and Mary worked together in the garden where Mary's particular interest was the flowers in the front garden, most especially the red tulips. Mary helped out with delivering the parish magazine along New Road for many years and enjoyed keeping up with the news in the magazine in her later years.

In the 1990s Ron and Mary enjoyed lovely holidays to Lake Garda in Italy, but also to Austria, Spain, Ireland, and Wales. In addition, Ron, and Mary organised coach trip holidays to Scotland and to see the Blackpool Illuminations.

Ron and Mary enjoyed a delightful 60th wedding anniversary celebration at the Fleur de Lys in the village and were blessed to receive a card from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

After Ron passed away in February 2022, Mary coped very well with the loss. She soldiered on, but over time, Mary spent much more time at home because of problems with her knees. She became increasingly dependent on Robert, Marilyn, her very good friend Judy and her cousin Brian, until she sadly passed away in June.

Mary's Service to Celebrate her Life took place at the South Oxfordshire Crematorium on 29th July, she will be greatly missed by her family, friends and neighbours.

What happens after this summer?

This will no doubt be another record-breaking summer for heat. We saw extreme flooding in the winter, deaths from excess heat in summer, and more wildfires than possibly ever before. Also, significant impacts again on UK harvests.

An Ipsos poll says that 3 out of 4 of us are now concerned about climate change. But we're clearly not prepared for what's already happening. UK Government action needs to address both getting to net zero, as well as working fast on adaptation for future climate extremes.

It's becoming clearer that local level action will be key. Rural areas have the advantage of space for both production of food and energy and also resource storage - water management being key.

Former NFU leader Baroness Minette Batters talked about the need for work on drought resistant crops, storing winter water in farm reservoirs, using roof top solar and individual wind turbines on farms as well as green gas production from anaerobic digestion (Radio 4, The World This Weekend, 16.8.26). Farms can also play a key role in nature recovery, wildlife-friendly management of trees, hedges, margins and less productive areas.

Water can be key in our landscapes - the restoration of so many lost rural ponds and wetlands. For firebreaks and as habitat, we need a mosaic of environments - woodlands, wetlands and grasslands. There are many potential actions to be taken at parish / community level too. Both in combatting biodiversity loss and mitigating and coping with the impacts of climate change. Actions include:

- Increasing tree and hedge cover - for shade, biodiversity, reduced flooding and carbon storage.
- Managing green spaces for biodiversity enhancement - including recreation grounds, allotments and burial grounds.
- Supporting pollinators by stopping the use of pesticides on kerbs and paths.
- Installing heat pumps and solar panels on community buildings.
- Designating cool spaces now as well as warm spaces for communities - this is happening in urban areas, especially the use of churches as cool spaces.

Comments from the East Hagbourne Parish Council Chairman

Local Government News It is nice to be back after the summer break. We had no Parish Council meeting in August and there was also far less activity from the District and County Councils. However, the big news of the summer is that the Government has made its decision concerning which of the three alternatives they have chosen for our future Unitary Council. They chose the three-council option so that Oxford City becomes a Unitary Council expanding its current size to include land that used to be in some of the district councils including noticeable chunks from SODC. This means that we do get the Ridgeway Council comprising West Berks, SODC, and VWHDC albeit without the nice rectangular boundary spoiled by the bites taken by the city out of our northern boundary. This change of council structure will first be reflected in the elections for the new Ridgeway Unitary Council in 2027 but will not be fully operational until 1st April 2028.

You might ask what this means for you. Happily, there is no change at the Parish (or Town) Council level but now all other council issues from planning to roads, education and social service are handled by a single council with hopefully more clarity and efficiency as intended by this change. At least I will no longer have to explain to people who is responsible for what, which has not always been easy to do.

Parish Council Elections Given that parish councils are not affected by these changes for unitary councils, there is still some excitement at our level. There will be an election for all eight councillors for the parish council next May, an event that only happens once every four years, and we have not had a contested election since 2011. So, when you are thinking how to allocate your non-work time, here is a chance to help make the village a better place and to have fun doing so. If you want to know more, come to a parish council meeting or talk with myself, the clerk, or any current councillor whose names (and photos) are in the noticeboard by the Community Shop.

Pavilion Car Park and Art Projects The major work on the Pavilion car park in the recreation ground should be completed in the first week of September giving a much better surface and better access to the Pavilion hopefully even when the rains start again. Shortly thereafter the new gates designed and built by Julie Grose will be installed. This was part of the Art Project with ear-marked funding from the 2017 S106 agreement with developers for Saint Andrew's Crescent. Of course, you may already have seen another part of the Art Project, namely the excellent artwork of Linda Benton which adorns the bus shelter at Lower Cross. The final part of the Art Project will be a stone sculpture or sculptures on the Main Road side of the Saint Andrew's Crescent estate which are currently being designed by the artist Alex Wenham.

Speed Signage There has been a lot of progress with vehicle activated speed signs since the last magazine with the order now in for their installation. Hopefully, we will be announcing their presence in the next month or so. There will be signs on all three major roads in the village.

Cemetery drainage We are all ready to go with constructing better drainage for the Cemetery and are only being held up by bizarre demands from the District Council with respect to planning. Hopefully this will be resolved soon and work will commence. We apologise in advance for any inconvenience during the works, but hopefully this will greatly alleviate the awful flooding we have had in past years.

Parish Surgeries I am restarting my monthly surgeries after the summer break. The next parish surgery will be in the Fleur de Lys on Friday 11th September from 5.00 to 6.30 pm. As always, feel free to contact me (iain.duff@easthagbourne.net), the clerk or any other councillor should you have urgent concerns.

Although I often ask the clerk or a council member to review parts of this page, and I am grateful for any improvements, this is not a formal or even approved article from the Parish Council. 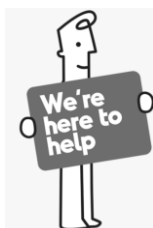
The Parish Council is in discussion with Oxfordshire County Council to establish what measures might be possible to help address parking and vehicle access, particularly along Main Road and in the central village.

Bus service to the Churchill, Nuffield and Warneford Hospitals

The bus to catch for any of these hospitals from the centre of Oxford is number 15 which is every 1/4 hour during the day, taking 10-12 minutes, longer at busy times.

You can catch it near the entrance to the Covered Market or near Queen's Lane. Those stops work whether you're connecting from Didcot with the Thames Travel X32 or, quicker but more walking, using the train from Didcot. The set down points are announced on the bus; for the Warneford, Warneford Road; for the Churchill, Roosevelt Drive; for the Nuffield, the stop is further on, called Lime Walk, and is actually in Old Road near the Old Road entrance to the hospital.

The website for the 15 is <https://www.oxfordbus.co.uk/services/OXBC/15>, where you can also find a useful bus map and even live information. When using the X32 to Oxford, it's also possible to connect with the 15 near the Police Station, generally fewer people trying to get on at once.

Thames Travel bus service to Oxford and the JR Hospital from Didcot – X32

The X32 service starts at Cockcroft Road, Didcot, which might be a convenient point for some people to catch it - every 20 minutes. It then goes to GWP South and down Wantage Road, past Didcot Hospital, to the Orchard Centre, Station, and on to Oxford and the JR.

Useful extra local 94 bus on Saturdays There is a bus, just on Saturdays, at 8.45am from the Lower Cross East Hagbourne to the Didcot Orchard Centre and Didcot Station.
